

What is a Certificate?

A certificate officially shows that you, through education, have gained skills in a specific area.

What is the difference between a Certificate and a Bachelor's Degree?

The traditional bachelor's degree is designed to be completed in four years and contains general education requirements as well as minor and/or major requirements. A certificate can be completed while working on a bachelor's degree, and, in some cases, without completing a bachelor's degree.

What is the difference between a Certificate and a Minor?

A minor is normally broader, covering a subject like English or French, while a certificate is narrowed to a more specific skill area that an employer may be seeking. Both a certificate and a minor are optional additions to a bachelor's degree.

Why Complete a Certificate?

A bachelor's degree is designed to be completed in 4 years; however, depending on whether you are attending college full-time or part-time, you change majors, or a number of other factors, it can take longer than 4 years to complete a bachelor's degree. A certificate is awarded after completing courses in a narrowed area and is generally completed much more quickly than a bachelor's degree, can count toward completion of a bachelor's degree, and can be finished before completing a bachelor's degree.

Additionally, a certificate can

- be a starting place if you are unsure what major you want to pursue;
- potentially allow you to begin employment in a field before completing a bachelor's degree;
- allow you to gain knowledge in a field that is different from your bachelor's degree major, without completing a double major, second bachelor's degree, or higher degree such as a master's or doctorate;
- add competitiveness to your resume.

Applied Data Analytics Certificate

The Applied Data Analytics Certificate is designed to prepare students to employ knowledge gained in analytics methods and applications to a variety of use case scenarios and data sets.

Students who successfully complete the program will demonstrate proficiency with analytic methods, data mining, and text mining through problem-based activities and real-world experiences in a variety of use case scenarios with an understanding of related ethical, social, organizational, legal, and security issues.

The certificate is offered in conjunction with the SAS Institute. Students who successfully complete the program are recognized as having demonstrated proficiency in solving real-world business problems with current industry-leading data analysis tools, including various SAS software products.

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Business and Technical Communication

The Business and Technical Communication Certificate provides students with opportunities to develop analytical and practical skills in planning, writing, designing, editing, and managing a range of professional texts for print and online publication. The certificate is open to students enrolled in undergraduate degree programs, including English. Students must register with the department prior to taking a capstone course. Other appropriate courses, including 5000-level courses, may be considered for inclusion upon review by the coordinator.

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Computer Game Development Certificate

The Department of Computer Science in the College of Engineering and Technology offers an undergraduate certificate in computer game development. It is possible to take the non-preparatory courses both online and on campus. The program prepares students to design and develop computer games and simulations. Students acquire technical skills in real-time rendering and content creation, and work with concepts behind the development of story, character, environment, level design, user interface and sound augmentation. The certificate can be obtained as part of a minor, with courses counting toward both.

The flexibility of the certificate allows students to design programs that include these courses. Entrepreneurial thinking plays an important role in all aspects of society and is critical in the practical side of career planning. The certificate prepares students to be highly functional in innovative and creative environments. This certificate is ideal whether you are starting a business to offer your professional services, joining an existing small or medium-sized business, or planning to work in an innovative capacity within a large organization (intrapreneurship).

Forensic Anthropology Certificate

The course of study for the Forensic Anthropology Certificate provides a basic understanding of skeletal biology and human osteology, procedures for the search and recovery of human remains, methods of individual identification from the human skeleton, time since death estimation, and manner of death. The student is also provided with knowledge of forensic anthropology for those interested in careers in applied, non-academic anthropology.

Multicultural Literature Certificate

The Multicultural Literature Certificate offers students the opportunity to develop cultural competencies that are urgently needed in the twenty-first century workplace and to prepare for graduate study. Students will build their knowledge of cultural diversity by taking courses focused on multi-ethnic American literature and world literatures written in English or read in translation. Courses with a special focus on amplifying the voices of women writers, LGBTQ+ writers, and other marginalized literary artists, including filmmakers, can also be used to fulfill the certificate requirements.

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Professional Selling Certificate

The Professional Selling Certificate is open to students in all programs across campus. The certificate is ideal for anyone who seeks to build skills in the area of professional selling. Developing selling skills is important because new college graduates often find that early-career job offers involve taking on a selling role. As a result, graduates need exceptional professional selling skills to be successful in this initial career stage to allow them to transition into later career growth. The professional selling certificate prepares students to effectively use established sales processes, sales automation tools, and selling techniques. The certificate also prepares students to identify decision makers of prospective buying firms and engage in persuasive communication of the selling firm's value proposition. The certificate is suited for students with a focus on business, communication, and other areas where selling and persuasion skills are beneficial.

Admission requirements:

Admission is limited to students matriculating at ECU in an undergraduate degree-seeking program. Applicants must have completed a minimum of 30 credit hours and attained a minimum 2.5 overall cumulative grade point average.

Students must earn grades of C or higher in all certificate courses in order to remain in the program and successfully complete it.
