

## How do I register for classes?

Never fear! This packet includes directions for registering for your first semester at ECU!

- 1. Make sure you follow the instructions exactly.
- 2. Do not wait until your Orientation to register.

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- 3. At your Orientation, an Academic Advisor will review your schedule.
  - a. If a schedule change is needed, you can do so through the first week of the fall semester.
- 4. Courses fill up quickly, so register for your classes as soon as possible.
- 5. If you were an Early College or Dual Enrollment student, make sure you submit a **final, official** transcript from your community college/university in addition to your high school transcript. Please email a copy of your COLLEGE transcripts to <u>THCASadvising@ecu.edu</u> if you need further guidance.

	Registration Key Terms
Academic Advisor:	The staff member who will guide you through your degree. Academic Advisors assist with course registration and degree planning, among other duties.
Add/Drop Period:	A grace period at the beginning of each semester when you can add or drop a course without penalty.
Course Load:	The number of courses you are taking a semester.
<u>Credit Hour:</u>	You may also see this referred to as "semester hour credit." Each course is assigned a number of credit hours that measures the instruction and learning for that course.
Full-Time:	To be enrolled as a full-time student, you should register for at least <b>12 credit hours</b> a semester.
General Education:	Requirements outside of your major that are chosen to give you a broad, "well rounded" education.
Orientation:	Required session/event where you will learn about campus resources, how you are expected to behave on campus (also known as a code of conduct), and will meet with an Academic Advisor.
Pre-Requisite:	Course or placement you must complete before taking a course.
<u>Semester:</u>	Measurement that divides the academic year into 15-16 week terms. The main semesters are Fall (August through December) and Spring (January through May); however, there are also shorter semester (8 week) options for some courses, as well as the Summer semester (May through August).
	A semester hour credit is how college courses are measured. It is defined by the Federal Student Aid Handbook as "one hour of classroom or direct instruction, plus a minimum of two hours outside class work per week, for fifteen weeks" (the length of a semester).

**Did you know?** If you want to complete your degree within 4 years, without enrolling in summer courses, you should register for *at least* 15 credit hours for the fall (and spring) semester.

#### Step Two: Choose your Fall Courses

1. Begin with the PRIORITY courses for your major. If those courses are full, you'll move on to the next step to continue registering for courses. You can check for open seats in priority courses until the first week of the fall semester.

#### Your PRIORITY courses:

English (choose one or two)	ENGL 1100: Foundations of College Writing It is recommended that you try to take this course in the fall. However, if it isn't available, it is fine to take in the spring. If you are unable to get into ENGL 1100, choose any 1 of these courses instead. You can also take one of these in addition to ENGL 1100. Foreign Language	It is recommended that you start your foreign language study in the first or second year.
	You must take four levels of the same foreign language.
	Foreign language options are French, German, Greek, Japanese, Latin, Russian, and Spanish.
	An online placement test for Spanish is <u>mandatory</u> —even for those who wish to enroll in level 1001.
	<ul> <li>Test information can be found <u>here</u>.</li> <li>Log into <u>Canvas</u> to take the placement test.</li> </ul>
	An online placement test for French, German, and Latin is optional.
	<ul> <li>Test information can be found <u>here</u>.</li> <li>Log into <u>Canvas</u> to take the placement test.</li> <li>Students with previous experience should take the test in order to start at a higher level.</li> <li>Level 1001 is for students who have never had the language.</li> </ul>

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<ul> <li>Students who wish to take Japanese, Greek, and Russian who have no previous experience with the language can start with level 1001 (no test required).</li> <li>There is no online test for these languages.</li> <li>If you have previous experience in any of these languages, you can work with faculty on placement.</li> <li>Please visit this <u>link</u> to contact appropriate faculty.</li> </ul>
<ul> <li>Students who take the placement test receive bypass credit without a grade, only upon successful completion of the course into which they place, as follows:</li> <li>Upon passing 1002, students receive bypass credit for 1001.</li> <li>Upon passing 2003, students receive bypass credit for 1001, 1002.</li> <li>Upon passing 2004, students receive bypass credit for 1001, 1002, 2003.</li> <li>Upon passing a course above level 2004, students receive bypass credit for 1001, 1002, 2003.</li> </ul>
<u>Note:</u> Do not attempt to register for a language class immediately after taking the Placement Test.
<ul> <li>If you take a Placement Test, you will have to wait for an email confirming your test score being recorded with ECU before you can register for a foreign language course.</li> <li>It takes approximately <u>3 business days</u> to enter placement test scores into the university database.</li> </ul>

	Most minors require 18 to 24 credits.

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	<ul> <li>Start with a 1000 or 2000 level course in that area.</li> <li>You may also choose to complete a double major.</li> <li>3-6 credit hours</li> </ul>
Health	HLTH 1000: Health in Modern Society Or RCTX 2200: Principles and Practices in Stress Management
	2-3 credit hours
Kinesiology	KINE 1000: Lifetime Physical Activity and Fitness Lab
	You'll likely take KINE 1000 during your sophomore year or later.
	1 credit hour
Mathematics	MATH 1050: Explorations in Mathematics (No math placement test needed) Or PHIL 1500: Introduction to Logic (No math placement test needed)
	If you plan to pursue a pre-professional field (pre-med, pre-dental, etc.), we do not advise you to take math in the fall. You'll take a different math course in the spring.
